The contrastive conjunctions 'but', 'yet', 'however', 'even though', 'instead', 'by contrast', 'on the other hand', 'on the contrary' are going to be essential in your essays, but especially so for AQA students as they prepare to do the 'how far do you agree' question.

Because they introduce contrasting or contradictory information, these contrastive conjunctions will allow you to qualify your statements, argue two sides to a question, and avoid statements which are too one-sided.
